News: RBI allows offline digital transaction

To push digital transactions in rural and semi-urban areas, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) issued a framework allowing offline payments.

Offline Digital Payment

- To push digital transactions in rural and semi-urban areas, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) issued a framework allowing offline payments up to Rs 200 per transaction, subject to an overall limit of Rs 2,000.
- An offline digital payment means a transaction that does not require internet or telecom connectivity.
- Transactions are subject to a limit of Rs 200 per transaction and an overall limit of Rs 2,000 for all transactions until the balance in the account is replenished.
- Balance replenishment can only occur in an online mode.
- Under the offline mode, payments can be carried out face-to-face (proximity mode) using any channel or instrument like cards, wallets, and mobile devices.
- > These transactions will not require an additional factor of authentication (AFA).
- Since the transactions are offline, alerts will be received by the customer after a time lag.

Significance of this move

- Push to digital transactions: Offline transactions are expected to give a push to digital transactions in areas with poor or weak internet or telecom connectivity, particularly in semi-urban and rural areas.
- Consent of the customer: It can be enabled only after obtaining the specific consent of the customer.
- Grievance Redressal: The customers will continue to enjoy protection under the provisions of circulars limiting customer liability and will have recourse to the Reserve Bank Integrated Ombudsman Scheme for grievance redress.

News: Centre considering Sri Lanka's proposal to translocate gaurs

Close on the heels of the project that translocated cheetahs from Namibia, the Indian government is considering a proposal from Colombo to export a number of gaurs, or Indian bisons, to Sri Lanka to revive the population of gaurs that have been extinct in the island since the end of the 17th century

Indian Gaur / Indian Bison

- Indian gaur is also called Indian bison.
- Distributed throughout South & Southeast Asia, they are largely confined to evergreen forests or semi-evergreen & moist deciduous forests.

- > IUCN Status: Vulnerable.
- CITES Status: Appendix I.
- ➢ Wildlife Protection Act: Schedule I.
- Recent surveys revealed that more than 2000 individuals are present in the Nilgiri region.
- > Threats faced include human-animal conflict and Habitat destruction.
